## Chat

During the event the chat function was used to allow people to share comments and ask questions. One area discussed was Environmental Sustainability with attendees also using the chat function to share their own work and recommendations:

## Environmental Sustainability

**Niki Black** : The big issue we haven't addressed here is environmental sustainability - the allure of the rural being very much entwined with an idealised notion of the rural. How do we as artists in the rural engage with issues related to climate change, sustainability etc and do we approach this differently because of where we are based?

**Louise Marchal** : I think public transport (the lack of) is key to this - sustainability and access.

**Vee Pollock** : Thanks Niki - we have an event on environment and sustainability coming up so hopefully we can pick that up

**Mark Adamson** : Hi All - not a full answer to rural sustainability, but the NE Local Enterprise Partnership have support and funding for rural energy for communities e.g. micro-generation,

solar PV, heat pumps etc - maybe useful for venues - more info :

**Dave Pritchard** : @Niki - That's one of the key areas of "misperception" that we didn't quite get round to in the breakout group, ie understandings of how the rural environment actually functions, its ecological/hydrological etc interdependencies, cycles, scales (spatial & temporal) over which change happens, etc, where food comes from, how water behaves, and the part this all plays in the wider cultural life of the nation (urban and rural).

**Ros Rigby** : Re climate change and how to get involved- take a look at

**Shane Finan** : On a positive side that hasn't really been mentioned, but that connects to this: My experience of rural communities is that, as an artist, when you ask for something (like electrical power) people bend over backwards to find a way to provide it. So limitations are sometimes also opportunities.

## BREAKOUT ROOMS

After the presentations we split into Breakout Rooms (smaller discussion groups) themed on:

- How do we better support rural creative communities
- How do we change perceptions of the rural
- What are the challenges and opportunities of working in rural contexts

Here's a summary of the key points from those groups

## How do we better support rural creative communities?

- Financial support: Northumberland County Council has fast tracked payments to arts organisations in response to COVID-19 and made small grants available
- PR / Comms / Collaboration support is also needed: pressures on rural arts officers, roles which have been impacted by local government cuts, mean it's challenging to provide one to one support.
- Culture Northumberland: <https://www.culturenorthumberland.co.uk/> was launched during COVID-19 to bring opportunities and events together in one place
- Training support: we identified some training gaps, around the anti-racism agenda, and around making applications for funding and work
- Freelance artists need support to make good applications – or maybe we need to change the opaque application processes
- Digital access: the North East has regional challenges around digital access, and we discussed schemes that are trying to provide hardware. Organisations like the Good Things Foundation <https://www.goodthingsfoundation.org/> are doing good work around digital inclusion.
- We finished our discussion by reflecting that some of these areas for support go beyond rural arts and culture, but all play a role and in the rural context, there are additional challenges around geographical and digital connectivity.
- Building groups and communication - issue of distance and access

the challenge of bringing rural communities together from across wide(r) distances

potential lack of transport and logistics, a factor sometimes not considered sufficiently by funders;

digital platforms are helping now (as a COVID response), but this is at the expense of in-person engagement and working practices;

getting young people to rural venues is a particular issue (e.g. the Creative Careers Programme via [Creative & Cultural Skills](#) where schools were unable to support owing to lack of access/transport) .

- Post-COVID - collaboration and new partnerships are a greater challenge owing to the loss of face-to-face contact where building trust is typically more natural.
- Need to develop strategy in smaller rural firms - many rural firms are innovative, but in rapidly changing and disruptive/uncertain times, developing foresight and future scanning capabilities will be important - developing capacity to be agile and responsive to 'what might be coming round the corner'.
- Need to consider the health and wellbeing benefits of face-to-face engagement and working - current pandemic may impact on this.
- Issue of digital exclusion (access to technologies, lack of skills and confidence, poor or inadequate connectivity) - this will impact on levels of inclusion and engagement, loss of opportunities, etc
- Need to profile the rural economy at a national level and through relevant platforms - relative to the predominance of the 'urban narrative', rural visibility and case studies is marginalised and 'not seen'.

Visibility can be increased via e.g. increasing current appetite for staycation holidays, buying local programmes, urban flight/out-of-urban housing interest etc

- Support for local produce/producers/creators - via retail and venues
- Development of a freelancers forum for rural creatives/cultural practitioners - will share commonalities with urban-focused networks, but there will be specific issues and challenges that should be shared

Potential to link to relevant rural aligned venues and/or platforms  
Support rural collaboration

- Engage young people and power of social media comms
- Consider what rural specifics are needed to fine tune business / practitioner support - take account of and consider particular rural issues.

## How do we change perceptions of the rural?

Who's perception is it we're trying to change? Who is this person or organisation, the Arts Council is important in this but we don't want to be always seeking external endorsements for what we do, we need to be championing what we're doing.

- It's also important to think globally, even in an isolated position digital technology means we are globally connected.
- It's important to celebrate the diversity of the rural that it isn't just this homogenous greenness outside of the city.

- Covid has meant some people have been given a chance to rediscover who they are as practitioners
- How do we use situations like this as a way of lobbying and communicating these ideas to the perceived centres of power, or who hold the purse strings or is this actually setting up a false sense of tension, where there isn't actually any?
- #WeTheRural slow conference on Twitter is really interesting way of beginning to think about some of these perceptions of the rural

## What are the challenges and opportunities of working in rural contexts?

- Most of our fairly brief discussion focused on ways of “Taking it local” – there was a view that better understanding and recognition was needed for ‘hyper-local’ approaches and the essential role this plays in rural distinctiveness – both in terms of cultural production and engagement but also, and increasingly importantly, the sustainability of local economies and communities (as places to work and live, as well as visit). This was seen as both an Opportunity and a Challenge!
- Challenges:
  - Access – public transport not extensive enough to reach rural areas, or on a schedule which is useful
  - Small audiences make cost effective events an issue
  - Suitable venues are scarce
  - As things are done on a smaller budget there’s a perception that its less professional
  - The rural can be seen by some as a ‘hostile place’ – e.g. it may not be so welcoming to refugees or asylum seekers
  - Artists are a cultural minority in rural places and so there is sense you need to constantly justify yourself
  - Lonely
  - Connectivity is an issue – broadband is patchy
  - Embedding yourself in the local community is hard – example of artist showing their film in local co-op just to find ways of connecting with locals
  - Access to power – for equipment for events is often a problem
  - Disproportionate investment in cities vs rural – Arts Council looking at ‘inclusivity’ in next 10 year strategy
  - Evaluation always relies on audience numbers - potential for trust based evaluation too? (has happened with funding models)
  - Also some views raised around increasing competition for funding - seen as especially difficult for smaller voluntary groups who have less resource to develop strong proposals than larger orgs that may be going for the same funding calls.
  - Physical distance and access to cultural offer (for rural communities) was a continuing issue (Taking it local = a positive solution). Digital can only be part of the solution, opportunity for physical / social access is also essential.
  - Partnerships – how to develop, open up routes for better engagement with (rural) local authorities was raised as an issue – noted presence of Northumberland in this event, but not Co. Durham for example.

- Opportunities:

Small audiences enable deeper/personable interaction/feedback

Digital downloads make it cheaper to run events – less costs – and increase accessibility as more can access these

Sometimes the challenges can inspire creative ways to engage with local audiences (eg showing a film in a co-op shop)

Less travel nationally means less impact on environment
