What are we hoping to do today?

This event is all about exploring what creativity and creative methods can bring to our work in military studies. To that end, there are a few questions to keep in mind as the day progresses:

- 1) What constitutes 'creative research' in military studies?
- 2) What can creative methods offer our understanding of military power and militarized cultures?
- 3) What are some of the challenges of this type of work?

This afternoon we will be exploring these questions in more depth, using what we learn from the roundtable presentations.

What does the afternoon 'mindmapping' involve?

Each 'roundtable' will be allocated a question for us to think about. Each roundtable will work like this:

- Roundtable presenters will have 7 minutes to talk through their work and how it relates to the set question.
- After all 4 presentations, there will be 10 minutes for questions from the floor.
- Those of us in the audience will then have 10 minutes to 'mindmap' around the roundtable's set question (e.g. 'What constitutes creative research in military studies?'), thinking about what we have learnt from the presentations and what the broad overarching themes might be. These mindmaps will help us draw everything together in the final part of the day.
- The aim of these mindmapping sessions is to learn from each other and collectively enhance our practice and research in this area.

What are the possible publication plans from today?

We would love to hear your ideas about future directions and publications emerging from this workshop! Current ideas include an edited book or special issue (possibly in Critical Military Studies journal). Please give an indication of whether you'd like to be involved and in what capacity – it would be great to have a diverse set of papers/chapters from practitioners, artists, veterans etc as well as researchers.
