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ZA1 Glaesmer: Most intrees changed their self perceptions positively about being a child of war during study #ESSHC2018 #oralhistory

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ZA1 Korhel: Czech-German children treated differently by State; determined by nationality of father. Uneven treatment discussed at the time. #ESSHC2018 #oralhistory

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ZA1 Korhel: A second factor was date parents married. If married during Nazi occupation then State discrimination, but result uneven across country. Strong anti-German climate.

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ZA3: Vickers: worried over oral history collaboration (intersubjectivities) when participants from different postions? Photographic approach by King also shifted Vickers' practice: an additional layer of testimony #ESSHC2018 #oralhistory

Homophobic violence added to sectarian violence and connected in ideology and memories #ESSHC2018 #oralhistory



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ZA3: Wallace: Result was mental ill-health, suicide. Wallace concludes that interviews reveal cost of criminalisation #ESSHC2018 #oralhistory



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ZA3: Discussion: Very large audience for this session and lots of interest and questions #ESSHC2018 #oralhistory

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For Herr C, his self-identity as a gay man and a non-German was important for his work, but also places himself 'outside' the migrant groups he worked with in the DAH #ESSHC2018 #oralhistory

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Ewing using fairly detailed discussion of his #oralhistory participants responses to consider diversity of experience within refugees and those who worked with them in Deutsche AIDS-Hilfe (DAH) #ESSHC2018

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Ewing considering continuity and repture between experiences 1989-92 and mid 2010s refugee crisis in Germany #oralhistory #ESSHC2018

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Next up, Ulrike Kloppel and Eugenia Januschke are discussing narrative harmonisation of the AIDS crisis in Germany and the struggle to 'open up' the narrative #oralhistory #ESSHC2018



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Kloppel & Januschke Playing extended, very emotional clip of interview w. older HIV +ve couple to demonstrate their methodological approach, interruption of interview to 'bring back' participant into the present #oralhistory #ESSHC2018



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On the other hand, Kloppel & Januschke they say public mourning should not be understood just as 'acting out' #oralhistory #ESSHC2018



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Kloppel & Januschke suggest that the relationship between public and private mourning need to be explored further, and the relationship between them better understood in #oralhistory #ESSHC2018



First up is Jakob Galeziowski discussing his work with 'vulnerable' people when researching children born of war #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018

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Jakob Galeziowski says 'layers' of vulnerability a useful concept for his work in Helsinki where he often ended up speaking to children or family members of 'children born of war' but found making contact with the 'children' themselves v. hard #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018 pic.twitter.com/HArMDHhz3m

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Galeziowski says in Polish there is no single word that captures the word 'vulnerability' which helps him think through the complexity/fluidity of the term #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018

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Association of vulnerability with weakness seems common, but there are other meanings such as sensitivity, empathy, which are more 'positive' readings says Galeziowski #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018



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Galeziowski says his current project has encouraged him to work more with traditional written sources, but oral interviews are still core. These interviews were personally very challenging for him #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018



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These interview encounters have stayed in his mind for a long time says Galeziowski. Sometimes the pain can be so great, that nothing can stop it, and sometimes the interview can bring more pain (for both participants) #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018



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Galeziowski says this experience has taught him about his own vulnerability, and that there are limits to what 'drastic' content he can absorb, although talking things through with family or therapist can help #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018



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Galeziowski says researchers need to be taught (formally rather than via 'corridor talks') about self-care and how to deal with potential secondary trauma #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018



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Next up Gisela Holfter on the role of oral history and life stories in uncovering the history of German speaking exiles in Ireland 1933-1945 #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018

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Official policy in Ireland was to discourage Jewish refugees from coming, but people did come, nonetheless. Policy changed in 1938 #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018 pic.twitter.com/2UO8le8dFH

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Holfter says German-speaking refugees often came as 'visitors' - including students and academics. Sometimes they were able to stay, or could make their way on to another country #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018

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Holfter Says another group of German-speaking refugees were entrepreneurs who sometimes got privileged govt support, also families and unaccompanied children #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018





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Holfter Says her project is first time all the refugees who came to a country have been traced in terms of background, but also how their lives 'turned out' - had to deal with lot of closed files #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018





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Late start means population now very elderly, so hard to do official #oralhistory says Holfter - more often asking for confirmation, cross checking. Something she regrets. Project has become a resource for families wanting to know more #ethics #oralhistory #ESSHC2018





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Now Susan Lindholm on 'Remembering a time of crisis' discussing her research into Chilean hip hop (created by artists in Chile and Sweden) as transnational memory work #ethics #oralhistory #esshc2018





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Azara & Betti keen to delve further into dynamics of women's employment and 20th century history - national/world events as well as changes in women's social position and relationship between work and family #esshc2018





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Next up, Pilar Dominiguez Prats on representations of labour in ILO through autobiographical accounts of two union leaders: Isobel Oyarzabal de Palencia and Regina Garcia #esshc2018





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Both women were labour delegates to International Bureau at Geneva in 1931, but followed very different paths and don't mention each other in their accounts #esshc2018





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Dominiguez Prats says both women are examples of 'modern woman' in Spain. Both middle class with 'respectable' paid jobs and education, but also adopting traditional gender role #esshc2018

Dominiguez Prats: Spanish II Republic (1931-1939) was important for women, because they gained citizenship rights for first time. But 40% of girls over 10 were illiterate, which limited their involvement in public sphere #esshc2018 pic.twitter.com/nCa2FR1gQ0





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Dominiguez Prats: Spanish socialists were part of ILO (international labour organisation) from beginning but didn't send any women as delegates until 1931, when de Palencia and Garcia attended Geneva conference #esshc2018





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Dominiguez Prats: Regina Garcia served on 3 committees of ILO - women's night work, child labour and coal mines. Argues that women's difficulties at work "could be solved if the social values of motherhood was recognised." #esshc2018

Dominiguez Prats says Garcia was anti-feminists because she saw them as fighting to be 'the same' as men and not taking into account the importance of motherhood, which she saw as central to women's experience #esshc2018

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Dominiguez Prats: Oyarzabal was representative of Spanish govt. to League of Nations - saw ILO as its 'most vital' work. served on committee on women's work and in 1933 elected to committee of experts on slavery #esshc2018
